Disabilities, Advocacy

Infrastructure, Design, Best Practices

- <u>USDA Accessibility Guidebook for Outdoor Recreation and Trails</u> provides many different design considerations on elements not as commonly considered like trash receptacles that can be accessible to people with disabilities but also keep wildlife out of the trash.



Activity Providers, Adaptive Sports

Communications, Promotions, Designations

- Access Recreation Guidelines for Providing Trail Information to People with Disabilities provides guidelines and additional information that public agencies and other non-profit
 entities should follow to share information about the use of their trail systems and
 recreational facilities, and information that should be considered during the design of new
 trails and features. These Guidelines do not propose to define the terms "ADA accessible" or
 "inaccessible" as they apply to trails, but to share information about trails and amenities so
 that potential trail users can make their own informed decisions.

 people with information they need to determine whether an outdoor recreation
 environment meets their needs for accessibility and their desires for an achievable challenge.
